

Instructions for preparing your poster DTAA Conference 20015

The poster session featuring DMT research or projects will take place on Saturday 10 July, during the final session of the day. You must be present at the conference for your poster to be displayed. All participants at the conference pay a registration fee, with discounts available to all presenters including poster presenters. Please bring your poster with you on the Saturday. Conference Co-ordinator Tess will advise as to how and when they should be displayed on the day.

Please provide an abstract for the conference booklet (100 words maximum)

Please include the following information in your poster: For research projects

- 1.Project title
- 2.. Project description that includes the following elements:
- a. the problem or topic being explored
- b. the research theory or framework used to explore the problem or topic
- c. the research question or idea being explored
- d. participants: how many, who were they, what was the context and
- e. the study or project method including data collection and analysis
- f. findings or major themes (depending on the type of data)
- g. conclusions and applications
- 4. Presenter(s) name(s), biography (75 words maximum) and contact email

For other projects, including innovative DMT work, projects with specific populations or projects relating to conference themes

- 1.Project title
- 2. Project description that includes the following elements:
- a. the problem or DMT practice issue being explored
- b. the theory informing the work
- c. participants: how many, who were they, what was the context?
- d. the project activity: what did you do?
- f. outcomes of the work: what was the result and how do you know?
- g. conclusions
- 4. Presenter(s) name(s), biography (75 words maximum) and contact email

Display requirements: All posters should be in large scale printed format approx. 1 m x 1.3 (horizontal) size (Officeworks and other professional printers can print this size poster). You will be provided a method of attaching the poster to the display panels. We recommend that you also have copies of a handout or flyer that conference attendees can take away.
